## 20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The HSAPC will provide organizationally independent, strategic, timely, specific, and actionable recommendations to the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) on key issues across the homeland security enterprise as they relate to the intersection of education and academia and the DHS mission.

## 20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The HSAPC will consist of up to 30 members who are appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the

Secretary. All members are appointed as Representative members. Members will not serve as Special Government Employees, defined in section 202(a) of title 18, United States Code. Appointments will be made without regard to political affiliation. In order for DHS to fully leverage broad-ranging experience and education, the HSAPC must be diverse with regard to professional and technical expertise. DHS is committed to pursuing opportunities, consistent with applicable law, to compose a committee that reflects the diversity of the nation's people. Appointments of Representative members are personal to the member and cannot be transferred to another individual or other employees of the member's organization of employment.

### 20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

Meetings of the HSAPC are held at the approval of the Secretary, but typically take place quarterly. Additional meetings may be held at the direction of the Secretary. HSAPC meetings are open to the public, unless a determination is made by the Secretary in accordance with DHS policy and directives, that the meeting should be closed in accordance with Title 5, United States Code, subsection (c) of section 552b, The Sunshine Act.

# 20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

Until the establishment of this committee, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) did not have a formal structure to receive advice and recommendations on student and recent graduate recruitment; international students; academic research; faculty exchanges; and campus and community resiliency, security and preparedness.

### 20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

HSAPC meetings are open to the public, unless a determination is made by the Secretary in accordance with DHS policy and directives, that the meeting should be closed in accordance with Title 5, United States Code, subsection (c) of section 552b, The Sunshine Act.

#### 21. Remarks

Under the Secretary's authority in Title 6, United States Code, section 451, this charter amends the Homeland Security Academic Advisory Council (HSAAC) charter and renames the HSAAC (originally approved on December 20, 2021 and filed with Congress on January 28, 2021) as the Homeland Security Academic Partnership Council (HSAPC) and establishes the HSAPC as a discretionary committee. This committee is established in accordance with and operates under the provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA), 5 U.S.C. §§ 1001 et seq. The Secretary swore-in the members at the HSAPC inauguration on September 6, 2023. On January 2022, the HSAAC Council was reestablished. As a historical note, on June 14, 2019, President Trump issued his Executive Order on Evaluating and Improving the Utility of Federal Advisory Committees (Executive Order 13875). The order required all executive agencies to review, evaluate and terminate one-third of its Federal Advisory Committees by September 30, 2019. As a result of this review, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) determined that the Homeland Security Academic Advisory Council (HSAAC) was to be terminated as a stand-alone Federal Advisory Committee. The Department reviewed options to incorporate the topics and focus areas of the HSAAC into

existing DHS Federal Advisory Committees, including the Secretary's Homeland Security Advisory Council (HSAC). The HSAAC was reestablished in January 2022. Since its establishment in 2012, this Council has proven to be a valuable asset to the Department, providing advice, expertise and experience that has supported DHS toward achieving its mission. You delivered more than 120 recommendations across a broad range of topics intersecting academia and homeland security. The Department has either fully or partially implemented more than 55% of your recommendations, which have been instrumental in founding several new programs, resources and initiatives across the Department.
