20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Advisory Board may analyze, review and examine work products, legislation, research, fiscal and technical support, policies, regulations, practices or operations of correctional agencies in order to execute the above cited objectives. See generally 18 U.S.C. § 4351.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Under 18 U.S.C. §§ 4351(b) and (c), the Advisory Board shall consist of sixteen members. The following six individuals shall serve as members of the Board ex officio: the Director of the Federal Bureau of Prisons or his designee, the Assistant Attorney General for the Office of Justice Programs or his designee, Chairman of the United States Sentencing Commission or his designee, the Director of the Federal Judicial Center or his designee, the Associate Administrator for the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention or his designee, and the Assistant Secretary for Human Development of the Department of Health and Human Services or his designee. The remaining ten members of the Board shall be selected by the Attorney General of the United States, after consultation with the Federal Bureau of Prisons and the NIC. Five of these shall be qualified as a practitioner (Federal, State, or local) in the field of corrections, probation, or parole, and shall serve for staggered

three-year terms. Five of these members shall be from the private sector, such as business, labor, and education, having demonstrated an active interest in corrections, probation, or parole, and shall serve for staggered three-year terms.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Advisory Board is authorized to meet up to a quarterly basis, but typically meets approximately 2-3 times per year.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

Chapter 319 of title 18, United States Code, establishes the duties of the NIC. See 18 U.S.C. §§ 4351-4352. The NIC is headed by a Director, who is appointed by the Attorney General after consultation with the Advisory Board. See 18 U.S.C. § 4351(b). Section 4331(b) of title 18 directs that the overall policy and operations of the NIC shall be under the supervision of an Advisory Board.

Specific recommendations/guidance to NIC have included: (1) develop and implement strategies for increasing NIC staffing (as of Q4 of FY22, NIC was at a 71% staffing level, with 34 of 48 positions filled; (2) fill vacant/expiring NIC Advisory Board positions, appointed by the AG; (3) implement internal infrastructure plans developed by NIC (e.g., securing a Technical Assistance Management and Information System (TAMIS) and

contractual IT support (both contingent on budget restoration and contracting timelines supported by BOP); and (4) continue to monitor and support the appointment of a permanent Director for NIC.

What is the approximate Percentage of these recommendations that have been or will be Fully implemented by the agency?

Number correlated to the list of recommendations above: (4) potential NIC director names were submitted to the AG by the Advisory Board twice in calendar year 2017 and once in calendar year 2018 (FY19). As a number of new Advisory Board members were appointed in February 2020, Chairperson Peters initiated a new review of potential NIC Director candidates with the Board in June 2021 and made a new set of recommendations with the Board's concurrence. During this process, the Advisory Board was supported by an alternate DFO specific to this work; the NIC Acting Director and "regular DFO" was/is recused from this process and any closed meetings where this topic is under discussion (100% implemented).

What is the approximate Percentage of these recommendations that have been or will be Partially implemented by the agency?

Numbers correlated to the list of recommendations above: (1) NIC has worked with BOP Human Resources to utilize other hiring strategies (e.g., temporary promotions from within BOP and continued use of Intergovernmental Personnel Act temporary hires) and has been given authority to hire up to agency authorized FTE allotment of 48. Hiring process continue to be underway since late FY2020 and - like many other federal and law enforcement-related agencies - hiring post-pandemic is extremely challenging. (1) During FY22, NIC hired seven (2) staff, had two (2) retirements and one (1) promotion, resulting in a net decrease of one (1) staff year over year for the agency. As increased work flexibilities are being implemented at the DOJ/BOP/NIC levels, it is anticipated that hiring and retention will improve in FY23 as staff wellness/work-life balance will be improved. (80% implemented) (2) Although this was fully implemented in FY20 (and reported accordingly via the FACA database), it has been put back into the FY21 and continues to be in the FY22 report as new vacancies arose both fiscal years. As of the end of FY22, the Advisory Board does not have a quorum and cannot meet. Acting Director Vanek worked with BOP/DOJ to recommend members for reappointment/appointment to the

Board. While appointments were initially delayed in FY20, the ten (10) public and private sector members were appointed/reappointed in February 2020 (FY20), resulting in a full 16-member board. Since then, seven (7) terms have expired over two years. Appointment recommendations for terms expiring in September 2021 were submitted to DOJ in August 2021 (no action to date). NIC Acting Director - with the support of the newly appointed BOP Director - will be consolidating the previous recommendations with additional new recommendations for submission to the DOJ in early FY23 to re-start this process. (80% implemented). (3) In the absence of adequate agency funding going in to FY22, NIC identified and explored obtaining other federal funding to develop and implement a TA MIS system. Since 2013, NIC had been without a TA MIS and had been required to manage a key database by an antiquated means (spreadsheets and emails). An application was submitted to the federal Technology Management Fund in early FY22, but was denied in February 2022. Once NIC's programmatic budget was restored in May 2022, it began the contracting/solicitation process to fund this work internally, and a contract was awarded in September 2022. Work has already begun and is expected to be piloted by the end of FY23. (10% implemented).

Agency Feedback Comments

The NIC Advisory Board has a positive working relationship with the agency and provides useful assistance to the NIC Executive Staff, aiding them in making decisions that impacts the field of corrections. There is an open line of communication between the Acting Director, Shaina Vanek, and the Advisory Board leadership. Both formal (during meetings) and informal (during periodic telephone calls/in person meetings at other events) communications occur. Formal feedback is provided at scheduled board meetings.

Action Comments

Due to significant reductions in NIC's programmatic budget resources from the agency standard \$14.6M budget in fiscal years 2017 (30%), both 2018 and 2019 (48%), 2020 (38%), and 2021 (44%), as well as reduced staffing due to hiring restrictions (2017-2020) / regular retirements and promotions (71% with 34 of 48 positions filled), the NIC Advisory Board provided guidance on NIC programmatic priorities (e.g., the greatest areas of need in the field of corrections). These recommendations aligned with the direction the Acting Director had taken with her executive team, with direction to identify priority areas to address once funding became available. the programmatic budget was restored in May 2022, back to \$14.6M. This will continue to be an area of work for NIC leadership as well as oversight by NIC's Advisory Board.
