## 20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Advisory Board on Toxic Substances and Worker Health (Advisory Board or Board) advises the Secretary of Labor with respect to: 1) the Site Exposure Matrices (SEM) of the Department; 2) medical guidance for claims examiners for claims with the EEOICPA program, with respect to the weighing of the medical evidence of claimants; 3) evidentiary requirements for claims under EEOICPA subtitle B related to lung disease; 4) the work of industrial hygienists and staff physicians and consulting physicians of the Department of Labor and reports of such hygienists and physicians to ensure quality, objectivity, and consistency; 5) the claims adjudication process generally, including review of procedure manual changes prior to incorporation into the manual and claims for medical benefits; and 6) such other matters as the Secretary considers appropriate. The Board discusses some topics as a full Board and also forms working groups around certain topics of interest. The working groups report their work to the full Board.

## 20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Advisory Board is composed of 12 members appointed by the Secretary. Pursuant to Section 3687(a)(2), membership must reflect a balance of perspectives from the scientific, medical and claimant communities. The Department of Labor intends that one-third of the membership is from the scientific community, one-third from the medical community, and one-third from the claimant community. Thus, the Advisory Board reflects a reasonable balance of scientific, medical, and claimant representatives to address the tasks assigned to the Advisory Board.

## 20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Advisory Board charter provides that it will meet at least twice per year through its sunset date of December 19, 2024.

**20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?** The Advisory Board is statutorily required.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

To date, all meetings have been open to the public. Meetings will remain open to the public except as otherwise determined by the Secretary, in accordance with the Government in the Sunshine Act (5 U.S.C. 552b(c)) and Section 10(d) of the FACA. Notice of all meetings is given to the public.

#### 21. Remarks

The Advisory Board's legislation originally specified a sunset date five years after enactment. See Section 3141(a) of the National Defense Authorization Act of 2015, Pub. L. 113-291 (December 19, 2014), which added Section 3687 to Pub. L. 106-398. Subsequently in 2017, Section 3687(i) was amended adding five years to the Board's active life. The Advisory Board will terminate on December 19, 2024.

#### Outcome Comments

Congress enacted the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act of 2000 (EEOICPA; 42 USC 7384 et seq.) to provide fair and timely benefits to workers who contracted illnesses related to exposure to radiation or other toxic substances while employed by the Department of Energy or its contractors. The statute specifically provides lump-sum compensation and health benefits to eligible DOE nuclear weapons workers (including employees, former employees, contractors and subcontractors) and lump-sum compensation to certain survivors if the worker is deceased. The Advisory Board is tasked with providing specific categories of technical advice to the Secretary of Labor regarding EEOICPA.

#### **Number of Recommendations Comments**

The Advisory Board submitted comments to the DEEOIC proposed rulemaking (RIN 1240-AA08), following its April 2016 meeting. The comments were filed on regulations.gov by the Chair on behalf of the Advisory Board. Since then, the Advisory Board has submitted 34 new recommendations or follow-up recommendations. Seven of these have been fully implemented and nineteen are in progress.

#### **Action Comments**

The Division of Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation (DEEOIC) reviewed/evaluated the comments received in response to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. The new regulations have been issued. DEEOIC Circular 15-04 has been rescinded. DEEOIC has included relevant updates to the SEM; is using an updated Occupational History Questionnaire; implemented procedures to allow industrial hygienists and claims examiners to speak with claimants and claims examiners when appropriate; leveraging technology to allow electronic access to claim files for claimants; implementing uniform (but not dispositive) guidance for physicians on various claimed conditions; creating presumptions of causation for claimed conditions; and analyzing Board comments in conjunction with other expert advice to decide how best to edit the procedure manual on various topics. The Energy program has also provided voluminous data to the Board in response to several specific requests, and has provided encrypted electronic claims in their entirety on several different medical conditions and with various adjudicatory commonalities (such as Industrial Hygienist or Contract Medical Consultant reports). The Board and the program continue to work together to address new topics such as COVID as a claimed condition and improvements to the SEM as a useful tool for assisting adjudication of claims.
