**20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?**

The Committee's purpose is to advise the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), other government agencies, and the private voluntary (PVO) and non-governmental (NGO) community on foreign assistance policy and programs in which the U.S. Government and PVOs/NGOs interact. The Committee also provides information and counsel to the PVO community on issues of concern regarding their relationship with USAID and other agencies, as well as fosters public interest in the field of voluntary foreign aid. ACVFA advises the USAID Administrator and others through deliberations on key issues at the Committee's public meetings, as well as through the work of its subcommittees. The Committee has several active working subcommittees that research and discuss the issues that are brought before the public in order to develop policy recommendations for the Agency. The subcommittees are organized on the basis of key issues that correspond with USAID's Pillars and important crosscutting themes. ACVFA disseminates information to the PVO/NGO community and increases public awareness and understanding of foreign assistance through its public meetings.

**20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?**

The membership includes individuals who work in private voluntary organizations (PVOs), non-governmental organizations (NGOs), environmental organizations, philanthropic and other foundations, private businesses, think tanks, and universities with international programs. All have expertise in international development, the role of the non-governmental sector, and public/private partnerships, and represent diverse segments of the U.S. public. The membership is drawn from all regions of the United States and is fairly balanced in terms of gender and ethnicity. Recruitment of new members includes diversity as a criterion.

**20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?**

ACVFA's public meetings are held approximately four times per year. The meeting agendas address specific, relevant topics on timely issues. The large attendance at ACVFA meetings reflects the public's interest in and need for these meetings. ACVFA is the primary source of objective analysis on specific issues related to the USAID/PVO/NGO partnership, as well as a broad range of programmatic and technical issues related to the U.S. foreign assistance program.

The ACVFA provides expert, relevant, and objective advice to USAID and other U.S. government agencies on matters related to the private voluntary community's role in international development and foreign assistance. The Agency Administrator uses the Committee as a sounding board and an ongoing source of advice and recommendations about USAID policies and programs. The Committee's public meetings serve as an established forum for the key constituency of PVOs and NGOs, as well as the general public to receive information about and participate in the Agency's decisionmaking process. The ACVFA provides analysis of foreign assistance issues, and makes recommendations for use not only by USAID, but by other government agencies, Congress, and the PVO/NGO community. The Committee's recommendations have resulted in greater understanding of and improvements in the working relationship between USAID and its partners as well as organizational and programmatic improvements at USAID.
