20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The National Sea Grant Advisory Board (Advisory Board) generally meets in-person twice annually and by conference call/virtual meeting as necessary to consider reports from the Advisory Board Committees. The Advisory Board has responsibility to advise on the performance of the NOAA National Sea Grant College Program, the status of individual Sea Grant programs, and the implementation of the Planning, Implementation and Evaluation (PIE) system.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The current membership is balanced to meet the legislative requirement that "not less than eight of

the voting members of the Advisory Board shall be individuals who, by reason of knowledge, experience, or training, are especially qualified in one or more of the disciplines and fields included in marine science. The other voting members shall be individuals who, by reason of knowledge, experience, or training, are especially qualified in, or representative of, education, marine affairs and resource management, coastal management, extension services, State government, industry, economics, planning, or any other activity which is appropriate to, and important for, any effort to enhance the understanding, assessment, development, management, utilization, or conservation of ocean, coastal, and Great Lakes resources" Additionally, as part of the Advisory Board charter, there is a required balance plan which include information and plans for recruitment and diversity.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The National Sea Grant Advisory Board (Advisory Board) meets at least twice annually. All meetings and Sea Grant program site visits are relevant to the Advisory Board's legislatively mandated responsibilities to provide advice to the Secretary of Commerce, the Under Secretary of Commerce for Oceans and Atmosphere, and the Director of the NOAA National Sea Grant College Program on the performance, planning, and operation of the Nation Sea Grant College Program.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

By legislation, the National Sea Grant Advisory Board (Advisory Board) is required to advise the Secretary of Commerce and the Director of the NOAA National Sea Grant College Program

concerning (A) strategies for utilizing the sea grant college program to address the Nation's highest priorities regarding the understanding, assessment, development, management, utilization, and conservation of ocean, coastal, and Great Lakes resources (B) the designation of sea grant colleges and sea grant institutes and (C) such other matters as the Secretary refers to the Advisory Board for review and advice. The National Sea Grant College Program is a complex program involving more than 300 universities that participate through 34 university-based Sea Grant programs located in all coastal and Great Lakes states, including Guam, Puerto Rico and the Lake Champlain region. As can be seen, the Sea Grant legislation provides a strong role for an independent advisory body composed of experts in marine-related fields. The reason is the mandate given to Sea Grant, namely to develop the commitment and involvement of universities to achieve -- through research, education, and outreach -- greater understanding, assessment, development, utilization, and conservation of the nation's ocean, coastal, and Great Lakes resources. The dedicated members of the National Sea Grant Advisory Board provide valued advice on these issues to NOAA and the Department that is critically needed to achieve the mandate and oversee the development of the National Sea Grant College Program. There is no other existing group sufficiently knowledgeable about Sea Grant's mission that could provide, over the long term, the balance and breadth of expert advice that is vitally important to a multifaceted, scientific-based program.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

21. Remarks

For fiscal year 2023, the National Sea Grant Advisory Board (Advisory Board) Program Implementation and Evaluation (PIE) Review subcommittee focused its efforts on the development of a report that included a revised allocation policy. An allocation policy is required at the federal level to guide the annual development and implementation of a spend plan for the National Sea Grant College Program through the Director. The Education and Outreach subcommittee discussed and explored the critical but often neglected role of environmental justice in developing and implementing resilience strategies and the ways that the National Sea Grant College Program can promote effective mechanisms to support these approaches, including creating a report for the Director of the National Sea Grant College Program. Additionally, individuals from the Advisory Board continued involvement in selecting Sea Grant Knauss Fellows, and serving as Board liaisons for the Education, Extension and Communication network teams. Costs for the subcommittees are included in the budget for the parent committee.

Number of Recommendations Comments

In FY2023, the National Sea Grant Office (NSGO) received 5 recommendations. The Program Implementation and Evaluation (PIE) Review subcommittee produced a report on its review of the National Sea Grant College Program Policy for the Allocation of Funds, FY 2024 and Beyond and included 1 recommendation to accept the revised policy. The recommendation and revised policy in this report was sent to the Director of the National Sea Grant College Program. This policy recommendation should be seen as the best compromise between sustaining excellence across the diverse Sea Grant programs while allowing for adjustments in funding as appropriations change. The Education and Outreach subcommittee discussed and explored the critical but often neglected role of environmental justice in developing and implementing resilience strategies and the ways that the National Sea Grant College Program can promote effective mechanisms to support these approaches, including creating a report for the Director of the National Sea Grant College Program. The report contains 4 recommendations in ways in which the subcommittee considered how the National Sea Grant College Program makes and measures progress on environmental justice and resilience. % of Recommendations Fully Implemented Comments

In FY2023, the National Sea Grant Office (NSGO) continued to move forward in implementing the 4 recommendations in the 2021 Independent Review Panel report: 1) PIER database improvements; 2) PIE policy alignment with OAR program review policy; 3) revisit program allocation policy, and 4) revisit its partnership framework. Improvements

were made to the PIER database. The allocation policy was revisited by the National Sea Grant Advisory Board (Advisory Board), who created a new policy and recommended its implementation to the Director of the National Sea Grant College Program. The allocation policy is currently under review by the National Sea Grant College Program Director with plans for implementation fall 2023 (FY24). The NSGO addressed the recommendations in the Advisory Board's "40% Competitive Research and Education Policy for Base Funding Report" (2022) by creating and implementing the "Competitive Research Allocation Policy". The individual Sea Grant Programs are expected to direct 30 to 50 percent of the omnibus budget (base + merit + match) towards managing rigorous, peer-reviewed research competition(s), as defined by the Sea Grant National Competition Policy, that address stakeholder needs through the creation of new scientific knowledge.

The NSGO continued to implement the 4 recommendations in the Biennial Report to Congress (2020), which are 1) continue to support the implementation of the Network Vision Plans, 2) continue and amplify efforts to incorporate social and environmental justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion in its organization structure and programming, 3) continue to actively seek opportunities and collaborations to leverage Sea Grant's Unique strengths in building coastal community resilience, and 4) make adjustments based on the findings and recommendation of the Independent Review Panel and Board Evaluation Committee. Final findings of implementation will be determined over this coming year by the National Sea Grant Advisory Board Education and Outreach Committee, who created a Quadrennial Report to Congress subcommittee to create the next report to congress (2024), which will address the previous report's recommendations.
