20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

Pursuant to 10 U.S.C. § 175 and § 10301, the Reserve Forces Policy Board shall serve as an independent adviser to the Secretary of War to provide advice and recommendations to the Secretary on strategies, policies, and practices designed to improve and enhance the capabilities, efficiency, and effectiveness of the Reserve Components. In addition, the Reserve Forces Policy Board may act on those matters referred to it by the Chair and on any matter raised by a member of the Reserve Forces Policy Board or the Secretary of War.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Reserve Forces Policy Board's membership is directed by 10 U.S.C. § 10301(c). The membership is balanced across the spectrum between Uniformed Military Members from among the Seven Reserve Components, seven Regular Government Employees and three Special Government Employees with knowledge of and/or experience with the Reserve Components that assist in crafting relevant recommendations to the Secretary of War in accordance with the governing statute and charter.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The estimated number of meetings per year, for the full committee, is four (4).

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The advice the RFPB gives comes from collaborative analyses from civilian and military professionals that form a unique common operating picture regarding Reserve Component capabilities. There exists no other entity that performs this function.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Meetings are not closed to the public unless the Department of War (DoW) determines items on the planned agenda meet the closed meeting provisions as codified in 5 U.S.C. § 552b(c). Pursuant to DoW policy, Department of Defense Instruction 5105.04, 6 Aug 2007, closed meetings can only be authorized by the DoW sponsor, Honorable Anthony Tata, Under Secretary of War

for Personnel and Readiness, after direct consultation with the Department of War's Office of General Counsel. In CY 2025, the RFPB held zero closed meetings.

21. Remarks

Due to the Secretary of War's pause of all advisory committee operations effective March 7, 2025, and the conclusion of all committee member appointments effective April 25, 2025, there were zero (0) meetings in CY2025. The RFPB adds value to the Department through its ability to objectively assess and analyze complex issues and offer pertinent and actionable recommendations related to the most effective uses of the Reserve Component in achieving National Defense Strategy objectives.

Number of Recommendations Comments

In CY 2025, the Board offered no recommendations to the Department. The lack of recommendations was a result of the Secretary of War's March 25, 2025, directive that all Department of War Federal Advisory Committees cease activities and release all Board members from their respective terms of service while the Department conducted a 45-day review. At the review's conclusion, the RFPB received notice of its reinstatement and

guidance to be prepared to resume operations at a time to be designated in the future. As of this report's submission, the RFPB is on the verge of recruiting members and has not yet resumed full operations.

Due to a myriad of reasons, the Board has yet to fully capture relevant details about recommendations that have been fully implemented during the Board's seventy-four-year existence. As implied by its statutory responsibility, the staff is consistently researching historical documents and current policy pronouncements to determine the nature of those recommendations and whether their respective implementation achieved their objectives.

Consistent with the Board's statutory mandate to provide advice and recommendations, Board members and staff provide consultant-like support to various Departmental efforts to fully implement the Board's recommendations. Many recommendations characterized as "partially implemented" require multi-year activities to reach desired end states. Noteworthy examples include, but are not limited to, implementation of Total Force Optimization, Duty Status Reform and defense critical electric infrastructure resiliency efforts.
