20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Board provides the Secretary of Defense and the Deputy Secretary of Defense, through the Secretary of the Army, with independent advice and recommendations on matters pertaining to the operations and management of the Western Hemisphere Institute for Security Cooperation ("the Institute"). The Board shall: a. Inquire into the

curriculum, instruction, physical equipment, fiscal affairs, and academic methods of the Institute; other matters relating to the Institute that the Board decides to consider; and any other matter that the Secretary of Defense determines appropriate (10 U.S.C. § 343(e)(4)(A)); b. Review the curriculum to determine whether it complies with applicable U.S. laws and regulations, is consistent with U.S. policy goals toward Latin America and the Caribbean, and adheres to current U.S. doctrine (10 U.S.C. §§ 343(e)(4)(B)(i)-(iii)); and c. Determine whether the instruction under the curriculum of the Institute appropriately emphasizes human rights, the rule of law, due process, civilian control of the military, and the role of the military in a democratic society (10 U.S.C. §§ 343 (d)(1) and (e)(4)(B)(iv)). The Board will, not later than 60 days after its annual meeting, submit to the Secretary of Defense a written report of its activities, views, and recommendations pertaining to the Institute (10 U.S.C. § 343(e)(5)).

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Membership is prescribed in the statute, but for those appointed by the Secretary of Defense, academics and representatives from the religious and human rights communities will be represented, to the extent practicable. The Board will be composed of 14 members, 6 of whom are designated by the Secretary of Defense including, to the extent practicable, persons from academia, religious, and human rights communities. The Secretary of Defense will also affirm the appointments, designated in statute, of the senior military officer responsible for training and doctrine in the U.S. Army (or designee) and the Commanders of the Combatant Commands with geographic responsibility for the Western Hemisphere (U.S. Northern Command and U.S. Southern Command) (or the designees of those officers). The Board will also be composed of: a. Two Members of the Senate (the Chair and Ranking Member of the Armed Services Committee or a designee of either of them); b. Two Members of the House of Representatives (the Chair and Ranking Member of the Armed Services Committee or a designee of either of them); and c. One person designated by the Secretary of State. (10 U.S.C. § 343(e)(1)(D))

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The estimated number of Board meetings is at least one per year pursuant to 10 U.S.C. § 343 (e)(3).

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

Committee is mandated by law under 10 U.S.C. 343.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Meetings are not closed to the public unless the Department of Defense determines that items on the planned agenda meet the closed meeting provisions of 5 U.S.C.§552b(c). Pursuant to DoD Policy, closed meetings can only be authorized by the DoD Sponsor, the Secretary of the Army or designee, and only after consultation with the Office of the Secretary of the Army General Counsel.

21. Remarks

This Committee was established pursuant to PL 106-398, section 911 of the National Defense

Authorization Act for FY 2001. Pursuant to 10 U.S.C. § 343(e)(4)(A), the BoV WHINSEC shall inquire into curriculum, instruction, physical equipment, fiscal affairs, and academic methods of the Western Hemisphere Institute for Security Cooperation ("the Institute"), other matters relating to the Institute that the BoV WHINSEC decides to consider, and any other matters that the Secretary of Defense determines appropriate. NLT 60 days following its Annual meeting, the Committee submits a report to the Secretary of Defense concerning its activities, views and recommendations pertaining to the Institute. The Board's meeting minutes and Report are the same.
