20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

-- The U.S. National Commission for UNESCO advises the U.S. Government regarding its activities as a member state of UNESCO by:-- 1) Providing expert advice in the areas of UNESCO's mandate, which include: natural science, education, social and human science, culture, and communication and information. The Commission can be solicited for advice in these areas, or members of the Commission may offer advice proactively.-- 2) Highlighting opportunities and benefits Americans may receive because the U.S. is a member state of UNESCO. These include access to UNESCO programs such as Creative Cities, the World Heritage Program, ASPnet Schools, Category II Centers, University Chairs, UNITWIN Networks, and clubs. In addition, members of the Commission highlight UNESCO opportunities eligible to Americans such as, fellowships, internships, participation in international conferences/meetings, and jobs at UNESCO.-- 3) Raising the profile of UNESCO in the United States to better familiarize Americans with what UNESCO is, what it does, and how the U.S. relates to this international organization.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

-- Under it's charter, the U.S. National Commission for UNESCO seats no more than 100 Americans with no more than 60 percent representing NGOs, 15 percent representing state/local government, 10 percent representing the Federal government, and 15 percent as Members-at-Large.-- Appointments to the Commission are from a large cross section of American civil society and represent a full spectrum of diversity in terms of ethnicity, geography, age, subject matter expertise, gender, background, professional affiliations, and viewpoints.-- As members rotate off the Commission, nominations for new members are sought from a diverse range of sources to ensure the Commission is continually able to offer a range of viewpoints representing our nations diversity.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

-- Per enabling legislation, the Commission holds at least one general meeting annually. However, the full Commission has had one additional meetings this year via teleconference.-- Committees, working groups, and task forces under the framework of the Commission meet, depending on the work at hand. Because Commission projects are specific and often require technical expertise, the convening of smaller working groups and subcommittees are ideal for making the most effective and productive use of Commissioners' time.-- Commissioners are encouraged to make full use of technology for communicating with each other and with the government.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

-- National Commissions are common as part of member states' participation within the UNESCO international organization (article VII of its constitution). Per the U.S. enabling legislation, while the U.S. is engaged with UNESCO, a National Commission shall be established.-- In addition to the recommendations provided, the Commission also serves as a liaison with U.S. civil society regarding UNESCO issues. The Commission is vital in the work to achieve U.S. Government objectives within UNESCO.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Commission occasionally receives approval from the Department of State to close sections of meetings because it sometimes reviews and gives advice on individuals' applications for employment or fellowships. Due to the personal nature of this material, the Commission has received approval to close portions the relevant portions of the meetings/conference calls; all other portions of calls are open to the public and specific designated time is given for public comments. There was not a need to hold a closed meeting this year.

21. Remarks

-- On October 12, 2017, the United States announced its withdrawal from UNESCO, effective December 31, 2018. Per the U.S. enabling legislation, while the U.S. is engaged with UNESCO, a National Commission shall be established. Narrative Description

The U.S. National Commission for UNESCO is a Federal Advisory Committee housed within the Department of State, which is charged with providing advice to the U.S. Government regarding its activities as a Member State of UNESCO (the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization). The Commission is composed of no more than 100 Americans representing NGOs, Federal Government, State/Local Government. There are also several members who serve At-Large. Commissioners are appointed by the Secretary of State to terms of 3 years, and are limited to two consecutive terms. While the Commission meets in person or by conference as necessary, but not less frequently than once per year, much Commission activity is conducted on an individual level and leverages members of the Commission for their leadership, special expertise, and ability to form a network. For example, staff within the State Department Bureau of International Organization Affairs might consult individually with specific Commissioners for their expert knowledge in a specific area. Partnership initiatives relating to UNESCO or UNESCO's areas of focus often precipitate out of the Commission organically. The Commission also plays a role in circulating and administering special opportunities (jobs, fellowships, awards) available to Americans through our membership in UNESCO.
