20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Alaska RAC members represent various interest groups and stakeholders throughout Alaska, and therefore provide valuable feedback and recommendations to the BLM regarding various natural resource management programs and land use planning efforts.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Alaska Resource Advisory council is composed of 15 members distributed in a balanced fashion among the following groups and within those groups. Specific interests include: Category I includes those holding Federal grazing permits or leases, interests associated with transportation or rights-of-way, developed outdoor recreation, OHV users, or commercial recreation activities, commercial timber industry, or energy and mineral development. Category II includes nationally or regionally recognized environmental organizations, dispersed recreation activities, archaeological and historical interests, or nationally or regionally recognized wild horse and burro interest groups. (there are no Wild Horses and Burros in Alaska) Category III includes state, county, or locally elected office-holders, employee of a State agency responsible for the management of natural resources, Indian Tribes within or adjacent to the area for which the RAC is organized, are employed as academicians in natural resource management or the natural sciences, or represent the public-at-large.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The frequency of meetings and their relevance depends on funding and the importance of emerging resource issues. Normally BLM-Alaska holds at least two to three meetings each fiscal year.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

It is beneficial that BLM Alaska receive outside counsel from private citizens on its programs and issues. The RAC's diverse membership comes from Native villages and remote towns, urban population centers such as Anchorage and Fairbanks, and from a number of points in between. The group meets periodically to review and analyze issues and offer sound feedback so the BLM can make decisions for what is best for the resources and the American people.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

All meetings are open to the public.
