The Committee accomplished its purpose of providing advice to the Secretary of the Interior related to the Secretary's responsibilities under the laws governing the Department of the Interior's management of Federal and Indian mineral leases and revenues.

The Secretary appointed 28 members to ensure representation of the interests of States, American Indians, mineral and other

Narrative Description

On March 29, 2017, Secretary Zinke signed the Charter creating the Royalty Policy Committee (Committee) under his authority and regulated by the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA). The Committee will provide advice to the Secretary, through the Counselor to the Secretary for Energy Policy, on current and emerging issues related to energy and mineral resource development on Federal and Indian lands. These issues may include determination of fair market value, revenue collection, and potential impacts of proposed policies and regulations, including whether a need exists for regulatory reform. In the past, the Royalty Policy Committee (RPC) focused mainly on issues related to revenue collection and management and product valuation issues. Past Subcommittees included: Marginal Property, Royalty Management, Oil & Gas Valuation, Geothermal Valuation, Sodium/Potassium, Coal, Net Receipts Sharing, and Appeals and Alternative Dispute Resolution. This RPC's approach is a full financial analysis of fair market value from the responsible development of American energy resources. With the overarching goal of increasing America's energy dominance, the new Committee will have a broader scope than the previous RPC and may address a range of issues from leasing, permitting, and royalty policy to product valuation regulations and revenue transparency. With a focus on increasing mineral and energy production and revenues, improving transparency and accountability, and providing a simplified, consistent regulatory structure, the Committee may look at a wide range of topics, including the following: Expansion of American energy development • Regulations for procedures for determining fair market value/fair market return• Process and regulations for offering Federal leases for conventional and renewable energy development on Federal and Indian lands. Federal and Indian lands valuation reform. Establishing a royalty system for hard-rock mining• Regulations regarding onshore and offshore present and future royalty rates and fees. Offshore cost reporting and cost recovery rules. Financial assurance and bonding • Economic modeling • Public

input and effects of leasing on local communities• Bid bonus protocols• Experiments with different leasing systems and protocols• Price-based royalties • Increasing competition on bidding [for coal]
