**20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?**

This Council is composed of both scientific and public members who provide the second level of peer review; advice on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and identify research needs and opportunities of the Center. During this reporting period, the Institute received 468 applications requesting \$193,836,335 in support. These applications were reviewed by initial review groups and were then considered by the Council prior to potential funding.

**20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?**

The Council consists of 18 appointed members, 12 of whom are selected from among the leading representatives of the health and scientific disciplines relevant to the activities of the Center, particularly representatives of the health and scientific disciplines in the area of complementary and integrative health. Nine of the twelve scientific members include practitioner licensed in one or more of the major systems with which the Center is involved. Six public members include leaders in the fields of public policy, law, health policy, economics, and management. Three of the six public members represent the interests of individual consumers of complementary and integrative health.

**20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?**

The Council met three times in FY 2020 on the following dates: 2/7/20, 6/5/20, and 9/25/20. The Council provides advice on a continuing basis on matters relating to the conduct and support of research training, health information dissemination, and other programs with respect to complementary and integrative health.

**20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?**

The members of the Council have a vast reservoir of experience, expertise, and abilities covering the broad spectrum of complementary and integrative health and provide the second level of review for research grant applications; advice on policy development, program implementation and evaluation, and identify research needs and opportunities for the Center. The quality, scope, and balance of advice from this Council cannot be obtained from NIH staff or other established sources because the membership of the Council is constituted to meet the specific requirements of the mandated mission of the Council and of the Center.

## 20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The meetings of the Council were closed or partially closed to the public for the review of grant applications and/or contract proposals. Sections 552b(c)(4) and 552b(c)(6), Title 5 U.S.C., as amended, permit the closing of meetings where discussion could reveal confidential trade secrets or commercial property such as patentable material and personal information, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

## 21. Remarks

Committee Function: Other - National Scientific and Advisory. Reports: This committee did not produce any public reports during this reporting period. The roles of designated federal official and committee decision maker are filled by the same individual based on the assignment of responsibilities within this center. Daily salary costs have been estimated for Federal Ex Officio members of this committee. No funds have been transferred between the committee and the agency. No additional funds are paid to Federal employees due to membership on this committee. Although five Federal Ex Officio members are identified in the member section, only two Non-HHS Ex Officio members and one NIH Federal Ex Officio (Chairperson) member attended meetings during the fiscal year 2020. Committee Members: There are three members whose terms ended on July 31, 2020: Drs. DeBar, Greenspan, and King. There are four members appointed from August 2, 2020 to July 31, 2024: Drs. Coghill, Haney, Jean-Louis, and Sherman.

Section 492 of the Public Health Service Act states that “The Secretary shall by regulation require appropriate technical and scientific peer review of applications. The National Advisory Council for Complementary and Integrative Health provides second level peer review, makes recommendations for support of grants, contract proposals, and cooperative agreements; advises on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and identifies research needs of the National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health.

Research grant applications submitted to NIH must go through a two-step review process that includes the initial peer review for scientific and technical merit and a second step of review and approval by a National Advisory Council that includes program relevance. In addition, prior to an award or funding being made, NIH staff must conduct an administrative review for a number of other considerations. These include alignment with NIH’s funding principles, review of the project budget, assessment of the applicant’s management systems, determination of applicant eligibility, and compliance with public policy requirements. After all these steps have been completed, NIH officials make funding decisions on individual grant applications.
