Narrative Description

In January 2023, the FTA Administrator asked the TRACS members to research and provide recommendations on 1) Rider and Worker Safety; 2) Reducing Bus Collisions; and 3) Data and Cybersecurity Management. Letter reports containing these recommendations were submitted to the FTA Administrator on Feb. 2, 2024 and contained 21 recommendations. They were submitted to the Secretary of Transportation for acceptance and have been published on FTA's website. TRACS continued work on a second task supporting each of the three forementioned subcommittees. Recommendations are due in early February 2025.

With the enactment of MAP-21, FTA received legislative authority to provide more robust oversight of public transportation safety. Recommendations made by TRACS will assist FTA as this effort and other requirements from the FAST Act and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law are implemented.

Number of Recommendations Comments

The committee was charged with developing recommendations addressing the following: (1) safety management system principles in rail transit agencies; (2) characteristics of an ideal state safety oversight organization; (3) methods for improving the development of non-regulatory employer prescription and over the counter drug policies, employee prescription and over the counter drug notification training, and employee notification information in accident/incident investigations; (4) a confidential, non-punitive, close call safety reporting system for the rail transit industry; (5) a framework and elements that should be a part of a Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan; (6) a framework for the National Public Transportation Safety Plan; (7) transit worker assaults; (8) fatigue management; (9) improving safety culture; (10) safety data and performance management; 11) employee safety reporting; 12) trespass and suicide prevention; and 13) roadway worker protections; 14) cyber and data security management; 15) reducing bus collisions; and 16) rider and worker safety.

What is the approximate <u>Percentage</u> of these recommendations that have been or will be <u>Fully</u> implemented by the agency? 70%

Sixteen letter reports with over 100 specific recommendations have been delivered to the FTA Administrator. FTA is drafting rules to meet Bipartisan Infrastructure Law requirements and several recommendations have been fully implemented to date. Other recommendations are still being considered and may be incorporated into the proposed rulemaking recommendations and other programmatic development.

What is the approximate <u>Percentage</u> of these recommendations that have been or will be <u>Partially</u> implemented by the agency?

Sixteen letter reports with over 100 specific recommendations have been delivered to the FTA Administrator. FTA is currently implementing MAP-21, FAST Act, and Bipartisan Infrastructure Law requirements and considering all recommendations as it moves forward.
