20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

This Council is composed of both scientific and public members who provide the second level of peer review; advise on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and research needs and opportunities of the Institute. The Council reviewed 1,199 applications requesting \$1,010,324,521.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Council will consist of not more than 18 members appointed by the Secretary (appointed members) and at least 6 nonvoting ex officio members. The non-voting ex officio members will include the Secretary; the Director, NIH; the Director, NINR; the Chief Nursing Officer, Department of Veterans Affairs; the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs; the Director of the Division of Nursing of the Health Resources and Services Administration (or their designees); and any additional officers or employees of the United States as the Secretary determines necessary for the Council to effectively carry out its functions. All appointed members must be eligible to serve as Special Government Employees (SGEs) and will serve as SGEs, as defined by 18 U.S.C. § 202. Two-thirds of the appointed members will be selected from among the leading representatives of the health and scientific disciplines (including not less than 2 individuals in the fields of public health and the behavioral or social sciences) relevant to the activities of the NINR and include at least seven professional nurses who are recognized experts in the area of clinical practice, education or research. One-third of the appointed members will be appointed by the Secretary from the general public and will include leaders in the fields of public policy, law, health policy, economics, and management.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

Meetings are held not less than three times each fiscal year. The National Advisory Council for Nursing Research met three times in the 2023 fiscal year. The National Advisory Council for Nursing Research provides advice on a continuing basis on the type of scientific research programs that should be supported and on how to carry out the designated mission and responsibilities of the Institute. It also provides ongoing review of the relevance and effectiveness of the existing programs.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The National Advisory Council for Nursing Research is composed of both scientific and public members who provide the second level of review for research grant applications; advise on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and research needs and opportunities of the Institute. The quality, scope, and balance of advice from this Council cannot be obtained from NIH staff or from other established sources because the membership of the Council is constituted to meet the specific requirements of the mandated mission of the Council and of the Institute.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The meetings of the National Advisory Council for Nursing Research were partially-closed to the public for the review of grant applications. Sections 552b(c)(4) and 552b(c)(6) of the Government in the Sunshine Act permit the closing of meetings where discussion could reveal confidential trade secrets or commercial property such as patentable material and personal information, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

Other: National Scientific and Advisory. Reports: This committee did not produce any reports during this fiscal year. Designated Federal Official/Committee Decision Maker: The Designated Federal Official and Committee Decision Maker positions are held by the same individual based on the assignment of duties in this Institute. Charter - Max Number of Members: The Charter was renewed May 30, 2022. Membership was amended from "The Council will consist of 15 members..." to "The Council will consist of not more than 18 members...". Members - Administrative Extensions: Dr. John Lowe was administratively extended 180 days as permitted by the authorizing statute. Members -Resignations: Dr. Grayson Holmbeck resigned on 2/16/2023. Members - Institute Changes: Dr. Robert Atkins changed institutes from the National Program Director and Associate Professor, Rutgers University-Camden to Executive Vice Dean, School of Nursing, Johns Hopkins University. Mr. Daniel Dawes changed institutes from Executive Director and Associate Professor, Satcher Health Leadership Institute, Morehouse School Of Medicine to SVP and Executive Director Global Public Health, Institute for Global Public Health, Meharry Medical College. Chairperson: Dr. Shannon Zenk's term dates were updated to reflect her reappointment. There was no gap in her appointment. Ex Officio - Dr. Lawrence Tabak's title was updated from Performing the Duties of the NIH Director to Acting Director, NIH this fiscal year.

The National Advisory Council for Nursing Research provides second level peer review, makes recommendations for support of grants, contract proposals, and cooperative agreements; advises on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and research needs of the National Institute of Nursing Research.

An action of 'approved' or 'recommended' for grants receiving review by this Council does not infer that the grant will be or has been funded. Research grant applications submitted to NIH must go through a two-step review process that includes the initial peer review for scientific and technical merit and a second step of review and approval by a National Advisory Council that includes program relevance. In addition, prior to an award or funding being made, NIH staff must conduct an administrative review for a number of other considerations. These include alignment with NIH's funding principles, review of the project budget, assessment of the applicant's management systems, determination of applicant eligibility, and compliance with public policy requirements. After all these steps have been completed, NIH officials make funding decisions on individual grant applications.
