**20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?**

Section 492 of the PHS Act states that The Secretary ... shall by regulation require appropriate technical and scientific peer review of -- (A) applications...; and (B)...biomedical and behavioral research and development contracts... This Council is composed of both scientific and

public members who provide the second level of peer review; advise on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and research needs and opportunities of the Institute. The Council reviewed the Behavioral and Social Research Program; the Biology of Aging Program; the Neuroscience and Neuropsychology of Aging Program; the Geriatrics and Clinical Gerontology Program; and the NIA Intramural Research Program. Council also agreed to undertake a review of minority aging research within the NIA, with a focus on science and training. The Council reviewed 9,742 applications requesting \$19,105,570,460

**20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?**

The National Advisory Council on Aging is composed of not more than 18 appointed members with research interests and responsibilities paralleling those of the National Institute on Aging. Two-thirds of the appointed members are leaders in the health and scientific disciplines, in the areas of biological, medical, behavioral and social sciences relating to aging and public health. One-third of the appointed members from the general public include leaders in the fields of public policy, law, health policy, economics and management.

**20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?**

Meetings are held not less than three times each fiscal year. The National Advisory Council on Aging provides advice on a continuing basis on the type of scientific research programs that should be supported and on how to carry out the designated mission and responsibilities of the Institute. It also provides ongoing review of the

relevance and effectiveness of the existing programs.

**20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?**

The National Advisory Council on Aging is composed of both scientific and public members who provide the second level of review for research grant applications; advise on policy development, program implementation and evaluation; and research needs and opportunities of the Institute. The quality, scope, and balance of advice from this Council cannot be obtained from NIH staff or from other established sources because the membership of the Council is constituted to meet the specific requirements of the mandated mission of the Council and the Institute.

**20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?**

The meetings of the National Advisory Council on Aging were partially closed to the public for the review of grant applications. Section 552b(c)(4) and 552b(c)(6) of the Government in the Sunshine Act permit closing of meetings where discussion could reveal confidential trade secrets or commercial property such as patentable material and personal information, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

**21. Remarks**

Committee Function: Other - National Scientific and Advisory. DFO/Committee Decision Maker: The committee designated federal official and the committee decision maker are held by the same person based on the assignment of duties at this Institute. Committee members: Drs. Goodell,

Reiman, Rosen and Wagers had their terms extended until the end of January 2022 in order to serve while the institute was waiting for slates to be approved. Reports: This committee did not produce any reports this fiscal year. The term end date for Dr. Francis Collins was changed from 12/31/2021 to 12/19/2021 as it accurately reflects his official date of departure from the NIH.
