20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Forestry Research Advisory Council (FRAC) has a mandate to provide the Secretary of Agriculture with recommendations and advice on forestry research, funded by USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) (formerly Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service) and by USDA's Forest Service (FS), in the context of emerging issues in the forest sector. The Council also has a mandate to serve as a forum for forestry research prioritizing and as a voice for forestry research needs and accomplishments to decision-makers influencing policy, programs, and budgets throughout the forest sector. The Council has addressed its mandated obligations this year by holding a general meeting to evaluate, assess, plan, network, and prepare a full report for the Secretary of Agriculture. The Council Chair made a follow-up visit to the Under Secretaries for Research, Education, and Economics and the Natural Resources and Environment.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Council is comprised of 20 voting members appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture and drawn from Federal and state, university (school of forestry), forest industry, and non-governmental organizations. Members serve on the Advisory Council for 3 years, but may be reappointed for a total of up to 6 years to foster carryover of experience, to continue leadership responsibilities and to strengthen the Council's ability to advise.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Council recommends that two, 2-day meetings take place annually to provide sufficient time for FRAC members to be fully informed and to develop sound and useful recommendations. The timing of the meetings is crucial to providing timely advice to the Secretary of Agriculture, particularly as related to budget. Meetings with such a diverse group of members are relevant in providing perspectives that permeate a broad range of forestry research priorities and coordinate USDA work with the forestry research programs in universities, industry, and other Federal and state agencies.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Council is the only entity which is authorized by law to provide the Secretary of Agriculture with recommendations and advice on forestry research. The increases in worldwide demand for wood, biofuel and fiber, coupled with increasing national and global concerns for the health of forest ecosystems, and increased numbers and magnitude of fires, is causing unprecedented conflicts over allocation, use, and management of the nation's federal forests. The Council discussed results from the recent review of the McIntire-Stennis Cooperative Forestry Research Program, which continues to be a highly

leveraged and productive investment of public funds; and made recommendations to increase the number of forest-related stakeholders on USDA federal advisory committees including National Agriculture Research and Education, Extension, Economics Advisory board, Biomass Research and Development Technical Advisory Committee, and others. The Council also recommended strengthening USDA research investment in Forest Service R&D and strategic thinking about knowledge retention strategies, upcoming retirements, and workforce planning; exploring joint appointments with non-federal research institutions, and increase coordination between Experimental Forests and Ranges, universities, state and other research forests on designs of new data standards, access protocols, and information management systems to improve interoperability of data and leverage data collection efforts with others.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

All Council meetings are open to the public and are advertised at least 15 days in advance in the Federal Register.

21. Remarks

The Forestry Research Advisory Council (FRAC) charter expired September 1, 2017 and is pending renewal. There was no advisory committee activity in FY18.

Narrative Description

The Council’s 2017 Report to the Secretary of Agriculture included recommendations

Enhance USDA extramural and university research capacities in forestry. (1) The National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) should utilize its higher education competitive grant programs to provide graduate student fellowships in forest science disciplines with critical shortages. (2) Funding for the McIntire-Stennis program be increased to \$50 million per year to train a diverse cadre of scientists that will respond to expanding threats to the nation's forests. (3) Amending the McIntire-Stennis legislation to include the 1994 land grant colleges should be a priority for the next Farm Bill. Expand Forest Service (USFS) Research and Development (R&D) capacity and funding: (4) Work with Congress to adopt alternative wildfire funding mechanisms and end the use of the ten-year rolling average to drive fire budgeting and end fire borrowing. (5) Restore USFS contributions to Joint Fire Science Program and return the JFSP line item to Wildfire Management. (6) Increase USFS R&D budget to no less than 10% of the total agency's budget by FY2020, to meet urgent needs, e.g., climate change, ecological integrity, insects and disease through expanded research capacity. (7) Invest in social science research beyond rural sociology and economics to better understand how forests address human needs and values. (8) Continue research on forest products and technology that enhances energy efficiency, carbon sequestration, and community and rural vitality. (9) Move quickly to fill the many open R&D executive and national program lead positions.
