20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

Currently the Council is administratively inactive pending the Secretary's approving the Council's Charter Renewal. The Council's meetings focus on their legislatively mandated duties by developing the categories for the Forest Service's Challenge Cost-Share Program (CCS) and recommending proposals to the Forest Service to consider in making their award decision; developing the Annual Accomplishment/Recommendation Report to the Secretary of Agriculture, finalizing their work plan and assignments targeting goals in the public's National Ten-Year Urban and Community Forestry Action Plan, (Action Plan), and considerable listening and discussion with the public on

emerging issues/opportunities in urban and community forestry. Council members attended the National Partners in Community Forestry Conference and met with their representative groups on the Council, other Federal Agencies, and entities working in community and urban forestry. The Council incorporates the public's feedback into their work plan and validate them in the accomplishment/recommendation report and grant categories. Last year they held a successful special listening session for the meeting participants that was well received and requested to be held again at next years conference. Comments were addressed and will be reported out at that time. The Council has a home page on the Forest Service website <http://www.fs.fed.us/ucf/nucfac.shtml> The site contains background information, grant announcements about the Council as well as their accomplishment reports and recommendations.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Council is made up of 15 members whose positions are described very specifically in the enabling legislation, membership consists of qualified candidates representing: State government; County government; City/Town government; forest products, nursery, or related industries; urban forestry, landscape, and design consultants; State forestry agencies or equivalent State agencies; professional renewable natural resource or arboricultural society; Extension Service; USDA Forest Service; a non-officer or employee of any governmental body representing a population of less than 50,000 as of the most recent census who has expertise and has been active in urban and community forestry; non-officer or employee of any government body

representing a population of more than 50,000 as of the most recent census who has expertise and has been active in urban and community forestry; two members representing national non-profit forestry and conservation citizen organizations; and two members from academic institutions with an expertise in urban and community forestry activities. The Council positions are also balanced geographically and demographically to reflect comprehensive viewpoints from around the country and the country's diverse populations.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Council Charter has recently been Renewed and the call for nominations has been closed and we are compiling the nomination package for review and approval. The Council meets about three times annually with at least one meeting held virtually. In general, the Council strategically plans future meetings with other related urban forestry stakeholders and the public to address items in the Action Plan and emerging urban forestry issues and opportunities. The Council reduces its meeting costs by: reducing the face to face meetings, reducing the meeting days from three to one and one half days; and using Federal meeting space or meeting space at reduced costs. The Council continues to steward accomplishments identified in the public's Action Plan, and continues to implement their Strategic Plan. The Council current recommendations are being addressed by the Forest Service.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The National Urban and Community Forestry Advisory Council has diverse representation across the Urban & Community Forestry Sector,

and continues to provide input that will focus and coordinate current and future efforts with the National Urban and Community Forestry Program, USDA, and applicable Federal agencies. The Council will continue to promote the economic, social (public health), and environmental benefits, that urban and community forests provide communities, which builds community sustainability and resiliency through proper management of this green infrastructure.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Narrative Description

NUCFAC is a congressionally designated advisory council to the Secretary of Agriculture on urban forestry and related issues. NUCFAC synthesizes the full spectrum of views into a consistent vision as a foundation for practical policy. The Council works in partnership with the USDA Forests Service's Urban and Community Forestry (UCF) Program, a cooperative program of the USDA Forest Service that focuses on the stewardship of natural resources where more than 80% of Americans live from small rural communities to metropolitan areas. Working with the state forestry agencies, the UCF program provides technical, financial, research and educational services to local government, nonprofit organizations, community groups, educational institutions, and tribal governments. In FY2018, the UCF program served more than

200,000,000 Americans in more than 7,800 communities of all sizes across the United States, about a third of which were rural communities. UCF funds are leveraged at least 2:1, often exceeding this ratio, by state forestry agencies and other partners. By synthesizing stakeholder views, the Council assists the USDA Forest Service in ensuring the UCF program is delivered efficiently effectively and with integrity and focus on customer service (Strategic Goal 1). In addition, by stewarding the Public's National Ten Year Urban and Community Forestry Action Plan and recommending workforce, economic development, and applied research projects for funding through the Forest Service's National Urban Forestry Challenge Cost Share Grant program, NUCFAC is helping to facilitate rural prosperity and economic development (Strategic Goal 4), and strengthening the stewardship of private lands through technology and research (Strategic Goal 5).

Cost Savings Comments

Council members serve without compensation for their time. In FY 2018, the non-Federal members contributed over 2000 hours in volunteer hours due to stewarding and implementing portions of the National Ten Year Urban Forestry Action Plan. This is equivalent to 1.25 FTE's valued at \$188,856, based on volunteer time prior to the Charter expiring.

Number of Recommendations Comments

Since 1993 the Council has made over 236 program and National Forest Service Challenge Cost-Share Grant Program recommendations. Grants funded urban and community forestry projects, studies, research, and best management practices. This successful grant program leverages Federal taxpayers' dollars on an average of 3:1, building a community's economic resilience through its natural resource stewardship. The Council grant recommendations address the goals and objectives in the 2016-2026 National Ten Year Urban and Community Forestry Action Plan. Prior to the Council's Charter expiring, they submitted their recommendations for the FY 2019 National Urban and Community Challenge Cost Share Grant Program. The Forest Service accepted the Council's recommendation and the Secretary approved the Forest Service's decision. The committee did not meet in FY19.

Action Comments

The Council recognizes the need to develop more green jobs especially for underserved populations and supply industry demand. The Council's past recommendations include assessing and building a green industry workforce. One example of the Forest Service's response to this recommendation is to compile and assess the Council recommended grant findings for this topic and present the findings to industry, academia, and

stakeholders. The Forest Service's findings identifying the disconnect between industry hiring and student urban forestry and natural resources educational curriculum were presented to UCF stakeholders as a primer for a round table discussion. As a result, the Forest Service and industry partners are currently developing strategies to address these findings by reevaluating existing educational curriculum and exploring new training/ apprenticeship opportunities that will address the workforce needs, create more job opportunities, and build capacity for rural and underserved communities.
