**20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?**

The purpose of this Council is: (1) to advise the Secretary of Agriculture on issues related to the participation of Native American farmers and ranchers in USDA programs; (2) to transmit recommendations concerning any changes to regulations or internal guidance or other measures that would eliminate barriers to program participation for Native American farmers and ranchers; (3) to examine methods of maximizing the number of new farming and ranching

opportunities created through enhanced extension, sound conservation practices, targeted rural business services, and financial literacy services; (4) to examine methods of encouraging intergovernmental cooperation to mitigate the effects of land tenure and probate issues on the delivery of USDA programs; (5) to evaluate other methods of creating new farming or ranching opportunities for Native American producers; and (6) to address other Native American related issues as deemed appropriate.

**20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?**

According to the terms of the Settlement Agreement, which initially authorized the Council and was approved by the United States District Court for the District of Columbia, the Council shall consist of 15 members appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. To ensure that the recommendations of the Council have taken into account the needs of the diverse groups served by USDA, membership shall also include to the extent possible, individuals with demonstrated ability to represent minorities, women, and persons with disabilities as well as persons who represent a diverse range of experience in different types of production agriculture. In addition, regional balance will be sought so that those representing Native American farmer and ranchers are sought and seated from throughout the country.

**20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?**

The Council shall meet approximately twice per fiscal year. Agendas are developed to allow the Council to discuss USDA programs and services, policies and regulations, and to hear public

comments. These meetings are vital in supporting the Council's ability to make strong and informed recommendations to the Secretary of USDA.

**20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?**

The United States Department of Agriculture's CNAFR was created to advise the Secretary on ways to eliminate barriers to participation for Native American Farmers and Ranchers in USDA programs. The Council was originally established as part of the Keepseagle settlement and has since been re-established under the Secretary of Agriculture's discretionary authority. This Council is pursuant to the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA), as amended, 5 U.S.C. App. 2.

**20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?**

The Council holds open meetings unless the Secretary determines that a meeting or a portion of a meeting may be closed to the public in accordance with the Government in the Sunshine Act (5 U.S.C. § 552b).

**21. Remarks**

The Council for Native American Farming and Ranching (CNAFR) met 2 times during FY 2018. During FY18, the Council held in-person meetings in November 29, 2017 and June 20, 2018. Personnel Pmts and Travel and Per Diem payments to Federal Members are not included in the overall budget for this committee and paid by the respective agencies under USDA. Costs associated with the committee does not include compensation for RGE members that serve on the Committee.

If CNAFR, which was created by the Settlement, is successful at identifying better ways to serve Native Americans, then the risk of another Keepseagle-like lawsuit will decrease. Many recommendations provided by this Council additionally benefit USDA's service to other historically-underserved constituents.
