ACCCNRS made nine recommendations in four major substantive areas. Each is noted below, with a status update. 1) Conduct actionable science as main program focus: The program is implementing this, and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future. ACCCNRS recommended changes to mission statements (underway; expected conclusion April 2017) and funding priorities (underway, continuous). ACCCNRS also recommended providing increased resources for communications and partner outreach. This is occurring across the CSC network. IMPLEMENTATION STATUS: 80%2) Expand outreach, communication and collaboration with partners: This is and will remain a major focus of the program. IMPLEMENTATION STATUS: 80%3) Work with tribes and indigenous partners in a respectful way, and assist in the use of traditional knowledges in addressing climate issues. NCCWSC has distributed the two committee products addressing tribes/indigenous matters (as requested) and is working to support regional dialogues with tribal partners. IMPLEMENTATION STATUS = 80%4) Develop and implement performance metrics. NCCWSC is developing a strategic plan, from which performance metrics will be derived. NCCWSC is also supporting academic research to

identify methods to evaluate actionable science. IMPLEMENTATION STATUS = 20 %
