20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Committee served the United States government concerning engagement with, and protection of, civil society worldwide. Functions include, but were not limited to:(a) Providing information and advice on the effective integration of civil society into overall foreign policy; and (b) Providing information and advice on the Department of State's role in advancing, promoting, and protecting freedom of association and expression. The Committee did this through consults with other interested parties, agencies, and interagency committees and groups of the United States government, foreign governments, and with national and international private sector organizations and individuals as the Department of State and the Committee decided were necessary or desirable. Through these interactions and with recommendations from the various working groups, the Committee drafted action to implement policy towards civil society engagement.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The membership of the Committee consisted of leaders from civil society in the U.S. and abroad and partners in the philanthropic sector. They included: leaders of independent public policy advocacy organizations, non-profit organizations that defend human rights and promote democracy, humanitarian organizations, private foundations and funds, charitable trusts, societies, and associations. Balance was ensured by using a consultative selection process. Candidates were distributed across the categories listed above, while also ensuring geographic diversity of membership, and striving for gender balance in membership. Individuals were appointed as Representative members, not as Special Government Employees. Representatives were selected for membership for the purpose of obtaining the viewpoint of the group, organization, foundation, fund, trust, society, association, or corporation that they represent. Representatives were selected to represent diverse points of view, to provide geographic diversity, and to achieve gender balance, using the considerations and process described below. A) Potential candidates were identified by senior career and political officials of the Department of State and through a website open to individuals worldwide.(B) The selection of members was determined by the Secretary of State's Special Representative for Global Partnerships, in consulation with other

senior career and political officials of the Department of State and FACA legal advisers, and after appropriate due diligence. (C) Vacancies were filled as they occurred through the same process described in Part 6.A and 6.B above, while ensuring that balance of membership along the lines described in Part 5 above was maintained.(D) The Secretary of State invited the members to serve for a period of two years or less.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

In previous years, meetings have been held quarterly to discuss working group recommendations. These quarterly meetings have afforded the working groups an opportunity to outline their recommendations for US foreign policy. Committee meetings provide a forum where all of the recommendations can be discussed and policy action recommendations can be drafted for the Secretary's consideration. The final Committee did not hold an official first meeting after the Committee members were appointed by the Secretary.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Committee provided advice and assistance in the formulation of U.S. policies, proposals, and strategies for engagement with, and protection of, civil society worldwide. It provided a formal mechanism for dialogue with civil society for the State Department. Recommendations from Committee meetings are sent in a formal action memo to the Secretary for consideration. The objective of the Committee was to bring to the United States government a source of expertise, knowledge, and insight not available within the Department or elsewhere in the government on these issues.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

21. Remarks

The Committee was selected and working groups were established and approved in 2016. The Committee however never had its first official meeting due to shifting priorities at the end of the Administration. The charter for the Committee expired in July 2017 and will not be renewed. Costs for this FY are based on 0.1% duty time for two employees for the one FY as no work was done on the Committee. Other costs highlight the \$4000 stated in the charter renewal. No additional costs were expended for the Committee. The subcommittees included: Global Philanthropy, Global Cities, Climate and Environment, Religion and Foreign Policy, and Global Education.

No recommendations have been developed for 2016. The committee did not meet in 2016 and the charter has expired in 2017. The FACA has been terminated.

Based on the recommendations from the Committee, the State Department has implemented the following recommendations:Facilitate U.S. diplomatic engagement with religious communities through expanded training and guidance for State Department officials;Build awareness for women's rights in countries undergoing political transition and work closely with MENA region civil society groups and governments to make sure women's rights are enshrined in their new constitutions and protected in practice;Institutionalize a platform for dialogue with representatives from labor and business groups at G-20 Summits; Develop new opportunities for south-south cooperation on labor issues; and Establish mission-based civil society working groups within the Dialogue to address issues of local and regional importance. Most recently, the State Department has worked in collaboration with the Treasury Department and IRS to revise tax regulations on equivalency determinations, which will reduce the administrative costs of foundation grantmaking to foreign civil society groups.
