20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Committee will provide advice to OVC and its Federal, state, local, and Tribal partners regarding the complex jurisdictional and cultural issues surrounding effective sexual assault reponse in Indian Country. The advice provided by the Committee will assist OVC in ensuring that its strategies, policies, and Intiative goals are responsive to the challenges faced by both those who respond to victims of sexual assault within Al/AN communities and the victims themselves.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Committee will include representative members, as well as Federal and nonfederal experts and will be comprised of the disciplines that are traditionally part of a coordinated community response to sexual violence. The Committee will include policy-level decision-makers from national Tribal organizations and federal agencies who represent law enforcement, prosecution, victim advocacy, forensic examiners, medical experts, etc.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Committee will meet approximately twice per year.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Committee will assist OVC and its Federal, state, local, and Tribal partners with understanding the complex jurisdictional and cultural issues that affect sexual assault response in Indian Country. The Committee will also provide recommendations on how existing Federal training resources, funding, and programs can be leveraged to meet the needs of Federal agencies and Tribal communities, and to enhance their capacity to provide victim-centered assitance to victims of sexual violence in AI/AN communities.

The Committee's submitted its Report to the U.S. Attorney General on Improving Federal Agency Response to Sexual Violence in Tribal Nations: Issues and Recommendations in June 2014 and Committee representatives provided a briefing on the report to the Attorney General in November 2014. The Committee's recommendations address a broad range of topics in the following areas: 1) federal agency collaboration at the local level, 2) DOJ personnel policy changes, 3) DOJ grant solicitations and funding, and 4) public safety and public health. At the request of then-Attorney General Holder, a draft memorandum detailing specific action steps the Attorney General could take to implement the Committee's recommendations was submitted in January 2015. Numerous rounds of revisions based on feedback from key stakeholders who were asked to review the memo were made during 2015. A final memo is expected to be received and approved by Attorney General Lynch in October 2015.

One recommendation has been fully implemented:Recommendation 4-D: Develop a formal, clear and transparent process to provide support to tribal law enforcement entities and their designated personnel in gaining access to NCIC. In 2015, DOJ announced a new process by which tribal law enforcement entities could access NCIC and other federal databases. DOJ also provided information and presentations to tribes about the changes. The changes 1) allow federal, state, local, and tribal criminal justice agencies to access NICS when returning firearms such as those seized during criminal investigations, 2) allow tribal criminal justice agencies to access NICS for tribal firearms licensing and permitting purposes, and 3) make changes regarding retention of NICS denied transactions records.
