The Task Force shall conduct an assesment of matters relating to sexual assault by members or against members of the Armed Forces of the United States. The Task Force will also conduct an assesment of matters relating to the prevention of sexual assault by or against members of the Armed Forces and of the implementation of sexual assault policies promulgated by the DoD. In conclusion, the Task Force will provide a report and recommendations to the Secretary of Defense who then forwards said report to Congress.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Secretary of Defense shall appoint a DoD Co-Chairperson and no more than 13 additional members for a total not to exceed 14 members. Membership shall be comprised of an equal number of DoD and/or military and civilian members.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere? Congressionally-mandated.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Meetings are not closed to the public unless the Department of Defense determines that items on the planned agenda meet the closed meeting provisions of 5 U.S.C.§552b(c). Pursuant to DoD Policy, closed meetings can only be authorized by the DoD Sponsor, the Under Secretary of Defense (Personnel and Readiness) or designee, and only after consultation with the Office of the Department of Defense General Counsel. Pursuant to 41 CFR Part 102-3.160, Administrative and Preparatory Working meetings are not subject to the open meeting requirements of the Federal Advisory Committee Act of 1972 (5 U.S.C., Appendix, as amended) and the Sunshine in the Government Act of 1976 (5 U.S.C. § 552b, as amended).

The DTFSAMS Report was presented to the Secretary of Defense on 1 December 2009. Pursuant to the sunshine provisions of the enabling legislation the Department is terminated the task force effective June 1, 2010.
