20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Roadless Area Conservation National Advisory Committee provides a national perspective to petitions submitted to the Secretary of Agriculture by Governors seeking to establish or adjust management requirements for inventoried roadless areas within their respective states. Existing management requirements are contained in current, approved land management plans for each unit of the National Forest System and the 2001 Roadless Area Conservation Rule. The committee will review submitted petitions in light of the petition requirements in the Administrative Procedures Act and provide the Secretary with advice and recommendations concerning the petition and any subsequent rulemaking.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The Roadless Area Conservation National Advisory Committee members will represent national organizations interested in the conservation and management of inventoried roadless areas, and membership on the committee will be balanced to represent diverse interests and points of view concerning this issue.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

Frequency of the meetings will depend on how many of the 39 governors submit petitions to the Secretary, and whether subsequent meetings are needed to provide advice to the Secretary during the rulemaking procedures following acceptance of the state petition. The committee will have 90 days from the receipt of a completed petition to review it and provide the Secretary with advice and recommendations.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Charter for this committee is currently expired. The committee is under review to see if

the need still exists to re-charter.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Meetings are not closed meetings. (See Charter)

USDA did not reauthorize the RACNAC charter when it was up for renewal, so the committee was terminated in 2009.

Narrative Description

Inventoried roadless areas represent approximately one third of the total National Forest System land base of just over 192 million acres. The mission of the USDA Forest Service is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of the Nation's forests and grasslands to meet the needs of present and future generations. The goals of the agency's strategic plan are to: (1) reduce the risk from catastrophic wildland fire; (2) reduce the impacts from invasive species; (3) provide outdoor recreation opportunities; (4) help meet energy resource needs; (5) improve watershed condition; and (6) conduct mission-related work to that which supports the agency goals. The conservation and management of inventoried roadless areas can implement and support the agency's mission and strategic plan goals in many different ways. The committee's advice and recommendations on state-specific proposals for the management of these areas will help the Secretary determine the best course of action for their future management.

The Committee has issued recommendations on 5 state petitions: Idaho, Colorado, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina. The Committee has also issued recommendations on the proposed Idaho Roadless Rule and the proposed Colorado Roadless Rule. Two additional recommendations were in progress for the petitions from California and Utah in September of 2006. However, California and Utah subsequently withdrew their petitions due to the Laporte decision on the 2005 State Petition Rule.

USDA and the Forest Service have implemented the Committee's recommendations on the Idaho State Petition and the Proposed Idaho Roadless Rule. Implementation of the recommendation on Colorado roadless petition is in progress. Virginia, South Carolina and North Carolina withdrew their petitions after the Laporte decision on the 2005 State Petition Rule, making the RACNAC recommendations moot.
