20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The enabling legislation directed the engagement of a Federally-funded research and development center (FFRDC). The FFRDC for this project, RAND, provides extensive research and analysis to the panel members as part of their

deliberations. The focus of the panel for FY04 was to build upon the previous four reports and provide the Congress and the President a vision of the new normal domestic security posture of the nation for the future.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The panel is composed of representatives at all levels of government, although at the Federal level - because of statutory conditions - the panel members are former civilian or military personnel. There are representatives of municipal government, law enforcement, fire services, and the emergency medical community at the local level, as well as various representatives of emergency services at the State level.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The panel has scheduled four formal meetings a year, and has had three extended teleconferences. It has adjusted meetings to meet weather and member scheduling conditions.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

In establishing this Panel, the Congress determined that therehad been no comprehensive, authoritative analysis and assessment of domesticpreparedness for terrorist incidents involving weapons of mass destruction, and Federal efforts with respect thereto. It therefore established this Panel and commissioned a study, with specific reporting requirements to the Congress and the President.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Some meetings may continue to be closed in whole or in part for the purpose of receiving and discussing national security classified information, or specifically exempt law enforcement information.
