Years (FTE)**20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?**

ISAC 16 members provide input to government representatives on a variety of subjects, including upcoming negotiations on the WTO negotiations, U.S.-Chile FTA, Free Trade of the Americas Agreement, the APEC Auto Dialogue, Russian WTO Accession, Central America FTA, U.S.-Australia FTA, U.S.-Morocco FTA, 201 Steel safeguard, Thailand Trade Investment Framework, and NAFTA Trucking Issues. The committee meets, discusses issues and prepares documents stating their and industry position on trade and policy issues as wide as global trade to specific trade problems experienced by their respective firms. The committee is made up of members from a wide variety of firms in the transportation industry. The committee reviewed U.S.-Chile FTA, U.S.-Singapore FTA, FTAA and NAFTA negotiations, the status of China PNTR, and APEC Automotive Dialogue negotiations and recommended to the U.S. Government that the United States continue to seriously review the economic and international competitiveness consequences of proposed national solutions to U.S. commitments. ISAC 16 members also encourage participation of industry in trade missions.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

ISAC 16 members represent industries significant to the United States' manufacturing base-motor vehicle, automotive parts, construction, mining, rolling stock and agricultural industries. A large percentage of ISAC 16 is focused on the

automotive sector. All ISAC 16 members are trade policy experts that are able to provide the U.S. government with quick access to industry views on trade policy.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

Last fiscal year the committee met quarterly with special meetings on U.S.-Australia, U.S.-Morocco, U.S.-Dominican Republic, and U.S.-Central America FTAs. The committee was terminated as part of the Industry Sector Advisory Committee restructuring on April 15, 2004. The actual number of meetings was dictated by Government need for private sector advice. The advice the Government receives from the private sector through the advisory committees will be an ongoing process and will be an intrinsic part of developing U.S. positions for all policy negotiations.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The committee structure ensured a unique source of information to the Government. All members had security clearances and through a continuing dialogue with Government officials were made aware of Government trade policy at a level not otherwise available to the private sector. Because these committees remained current in the broad spectrum of trade policy rather than a single facet-as would be the case in the absence of a committee structure -the private sector input from the committees was more pertinent. The advisory committee program, legislatively mandated was the single formal comprehensive consultative link between the U.S. Government and U.S. industry and had the responsibility to address all issues concerning trade policy.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Industry Consultations Program was established by the Trade Act of 1974 and in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA). Subsection 135(f) of the Trade Act provided that the ISACs shall be exempt from the provisions of the FACA relating to open meetings, public notice, public participation, and public availability of documents when it was determined that the proceedings would, if disclosed, seriously compromise the Government's negotiating objectives or bargaining positions regarding trade policy matters. ISAC meetings routinely involved these kinds of discussions. The United States Trade Representative (USTR) evaluated each meeting agenda and issued a Notice of Determination when it was necessary to close meetings.
