20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

ISAC 11 produced four written recommendations as a group, concerning the U.S.-Australia, U.S.-Central America, U.S.-Morocco, and U.S.-Dominican Republic Free Trade Agreements. The members also provided extensive advice directly to pertinent agencies and negotiators during ISAC 11 meetings, through the DFO, and on an individual basis. This input has had a significant effect on Agency operations. ISAC 11 members have a strong interest in issues relating to trade (particularly industrial market access) and to trade and the environment. ISAC 11 has been a leader in providing advice which has assisted the U.S. Government's policymaking on many such issues. ISAC 11, through its members, continues to be instrumental in ensuring that commercial considerations are not abandoned in the negotiation of multilateral environmental agreements. ISAC 11 has also been a leading advisor on other technical barriers to trade and on such issues as dual-use technology export controls.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The composition of ISAC 11 is fairly diverse across the major sectors which form the

nonferrous metals industry, and includes storage battery manufacturers. To some extent, the presence of industry associations representing both producers and downstream fabricators has ensured that a relatively balanced point of view is provided. However, a number of U.S. nonferrous metals industries are currently not represented on the ISAC. The most prominent of these is the magnesium industry and the large U.S. scrap recycling industry. The U.S. lead industry is only represented indirectly. A large number of U.S. primary, secondary, and semi-fabricated nonferrous metals producers are not represented because of majority foreign ownership. ISAC 11 member views on such issues as industrial market access (tariffs) are not always convergent.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The committee will meet about five times per year, depending on the Government's need for private sector advice and ISAC 11's desire to be briefed. This need is often directly related to the activity of U.S. Government negotiators in multilateral and bilateral trade and environment negotiations, such as within the WTO, Free Trade Agreement of the Americas, the Basel Convention, or APEC.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The committee structure ensures a unique source of information to the Government. All members have security clearances and through a continuing dialogue with Government officials are made aware of Government trade policies at a level not otherwise available to the private sector. Because these committees remain current in the broad spectrum of trade policy, the private sector input from the committees is more pertinent. The

advisory committee program, legislatively mandated, is the single formal comprehensive consultative link between the U.S. Government and U.S. industry and has the responsibility to address all issues concerning trade policy. Most importantly, U.S. Government agencies, such as the Department of State and EPA, in addition to Commerce and USTR, have come to depend on the ISACs as reservoirs of private sector advice and comment, particularly useful as the groups are divided functionally by industry, and hold clearances allowing for more in-depth discussion.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Industry Consultations Program was established by the Trade Act of 1974 and in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA). Subsection 135(f) of the Trade Act provides that the ISACs shall be exempt from the provisions of the FACA relating to open meetings, public notice, public participation, and public availability of documents when it is determined that the proceedings would, if disclosed, seriously compromise the Government's negotiating objectives or bargaining positions regarding trade policy matters. ISAC meetings routinely involve these kinds of discussions. The United States Trade Representative (USTR) evaluates each meeting agenda and issues a Notice of Determination when it is necessary to close meetings.

Narrative Description

The Committee shall perform such functions and duties and prepare reports, as required by Section 135 of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended, with respect to the sector and functional advisory committees. The Committee advises the Secretary and the USTR concerning the trade matters referred to in Sections 101, 102, and 124 of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended; with respect to the operation of any trade agreement once entered into; and with respect to other matters arising in connection with the development, implementation, and administration of the trade policy of the United States including those matters referred to in Reorganization Plan Number 3 of 1979 and Executive Order 12188, and the priorities for actions thereunder. In particular, the Committee provides detailed policy and technical advice, information, and recommendations to the Secretary and the USTR regarding trade barriers and implementation of trade agreements negotiated under Sections 101 or 102 of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended, and Sections 1102 and 1103 of the 1988 Trade Act, which affect the products of its sector; and performs such other advisory functions relevant to U.S. trade policy as may be requested by the Secretary and the USTR or their designees.
