# 20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

ISAC 13 meets regularly (it met 13 times in FY 2004) to discuss trade policy issues and priorities for service industries with representatives from many government agencies, including the Departments of Commerce, Justice, Labor, State, Treasury, Transportation, the Environmental Protection Agency, and USTR. Members express their opinions on proposed policy initiatives directly to trade policy negotiators at ISAC meetings. The committee also writes letters of recommendations to the Administration stating its consensus opinion on policy matters. In FY 2004, ISAC 13 made effective use of the closed meeting format to examine and provide specific comments on draft services related text for active bilateral and multilateral trade negotiations, such as those related to the U.S.-Australia, Dominican Republic and Morocco FTAs, the U.S.-Central America FTA, negotiations with the South African Customs Union, the Free Trade Area of the Americas, and the General Agreement on Trade in Services.

# 20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Representatives from nearly all of the major

service industries serve on ISAC 13. Its members are carefully recruited from the sectors listed below so that the Committee truly represents the broad, diverse services industry. When a committee member resigns, attempts are made to immediately recruit another representative from the same industry to maintain balanced sectoral representation. Sectors represented on ISAC 13 include: Accountancy, Advertising, Architecture, Audio-visual, Education and Training, Energy, (construction related) Engineering, Entertainment, Environmental services, Express Delivery; Financial, Healthcare, Information Technology, Insurance, Legal, Management Consulting, Telecommunications, Transportation, and Travel and Tourism.

# 20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Committee met 13 times in FY 2004; however, the actual number of meetings is dictated by Government need for private sector advice. During the FY 2004, the U.S. Government has been engaged in multilateral and bilateral trade policy initiatives including the General Agreement on Trade and Services (GATS), U.S.-Morocco FTA, U.S.-Australia FTA, the U.S.-Central America FTA and the U.S.-Dominican Republic FTA; negotiations with the South African Customs Union (SACU), the Free Trade Area of the Americas and its working groups, and the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation Forum (APEC). The advice provided through the advisory committee constitutes a very unique and committed way for the entire industry to formulate a position for the sector that strengthens the position of the US negotiators in international settings. ISAC 13 has made invaluable contributions to the development of

### 20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Committee structure ensures a unique source of information to the U.S. Government, All members have security clearances, and through a continuing dialogue with Government officials, are made aware of Government trade policy at a level not otherwise available to the private sector. Because these committees remain current in the broad spectrum of trade policy rather than a single facet--as would be the case in the absence of a committee structure--the private sector input from the committees is more pertinent. The advisory committee program, legislatively mandated, is the single, formal, comprehensive, consultative link between the U.S. Government and U.S. industry, and has the responsibility to address all issues concerning trade policy.

# 20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Industry Consultations Program (ICP) was established by the Trade Act of 1974 and in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA). Subsection 135(f) of the Trade Act provides that the ISACs shall be exempt from the provisions of the FACA relating to open meetings, public notice, public participation, and public availability of documents when it is determined that the proceedings would, if disclosed, seriously compromise the Government's negotiating objectives or bargaining positions regarding trade policy matters. The meetings of the Industry Sector Advisory Committee on Services (ISAC 13) routinely involve these kinds of discussions. The United States Trade Representative (USTR) evaluates each meeting agenda and issues a

Notice of Determination when it is necessary to close meetings.

Commerce internal procedures require that all responses for Secretarial signature (and/or joint signature with USTR) go through a concurrence process which ensures that all appropriate level Commerce officials are seeing the advice and have a chance for comment. All formal responses must be cleared by the Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade prior to the Secretary's signature, which ensures that ITAC advice is weighed and considered.
