20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

ISAC 9 provided advice and recommendations on a wide range of trade policy issues affecting the building products industry. Key issues in FY 2004 included: Doha Round of WTO negotiations, CAFTA-US Free Trade Agreement, Australia-US Free Trade Agreement, Morocco-US Free Trade Agreement Free Trade Area of the Americas negotiations, Environmental Regulations and Global Warming, China WTO Compliance, Building Product standards, and Dominican Republic-US Free Trade Agreement.Other issues included: DoC Manufacturing Initiative, Super 301 report on foreign trade barriers, Generalized System of Preferences, High Foreign Tariff Rates, Foreign corrupt practices, Foreign sales corporations, and European Union enlargement. ISAC 9 accomplished most of its work at the regular meetings held quarterly. During these meetings, the Committee advised U.S. officials who want industry advice, and conversely, the Committee was briefed by U.S. officials on subjects of concern to the building products industry. As part of the advisory process, ISAC 9 produced a quarterly priorities statement, which states the highest-priority trade issues and the

ISAC position on these issues. This priorities statement is reviewed and updated at each meeting given informally to interested trade officials at USTR and Commerce. The Committee also prepared four reports on the four FTAs that were concluded between Oct.1, 2003 and May 1, 2004: Cafta-US FTA, Australia-US FTA, Morocco-US FTA, and Dominican Republic-US FTA.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

ISAC 9 represents most of the wide variety of building materials that are produced by this sector. Among the many products represented are: glass, window screens, gypsum board, ceiling tiles, floor tiles, vinyl flooring, insulation, plumbing products, door locks, prefabricated housing, insulation, steel pipe, cement, and builders' hardware. The membership is mostly drawn from large companies, although two small businesses are represented. Two of the members are trade associations, which often reflect the views of smaller businesses.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Committee meets approximately four times a year. However, the actual number of meetings is dictated by Government need for private sector advice. The U.S. Government will be engaged in multilateral and bilateral trade policy initiatives including Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development issues, Japan, World Trade Organization implementation and accession by Russia, China, Saudi Arabia, and other countries, and enforcement of trade agreements. The advice the Government receives from the private sector

through the advisory committee will be an on-going process and will be an intrinsic part of developing U.S. positions for all policy negotiations.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Committee structure ensures a unique source of information to the Government. All members have security clearances and through a continuing dialogue with Government officials are made aware of Government trade policy at a level not otherwise available to the private sector. Because this Committee remains current in the broad spectrum of trade policy rather than a single facet--as would be the case in the absence of a committee structure--the private sector input from the committee is more pertinent. The advisory committee program, legislatively mandated, is the single formal comprehensive consultative link between the U.S. Government and U.S. industry and has the responsibility to address all issues concerning trade policy.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Industry Consultations Program was established by the Trade Act of 1974 and in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA). Subsection 135(f) of the Trade Act provides that the ISACs shall be exempt from the provisions of the FACA relating to open meetings, public notice, public participation, and public availability of documents when it is determined that the proceedings would, if disclosed, seriously compromise the Government's negotiating objectives or bargaining positions regarding trade policy matters. ISAC meetings routinely involve these kinds of discussions. The United States

Trade Representative (USTR) evaluates each meeting agenda and issues a Notice of Determination when it is necessary to close meetings.
