20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

In accomplishing its duties, the Commission formed five working committees to take on specific tasks for Commission consideration, and an executive committee composed of the Commission Chairman and the chairman of each committee; conducted Town Hall Meetings in various regions of the country to solicit input from the public and to publicize the movement to develop the Museum; and worked with subject matter experts and consultants to conduct research and studies leading to preparation of its report.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

As directed by the enabling legislation, the Commission was composed of 23 members: (a) 7 voting members appointed by the President; (b) 6 voting members and 2 non-voting members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and 6 voting members and 2 non-voting members appointed by the Senate Majority Leader. The members were chosen from the following professional groups: (a) professional museum associations, including the Association of African American Museums and African American Museum Cultural Complex, Inc; and (b) academic

institutions and groups committed to the research and study of African American life, art, history, and culture, including Historically Black Colleges and Universities and the Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Commission met twice in FY 2003, and a total of four times during its term (July 16-17, 2002; September 24-25, 2002; December 3-4, 2002; and March 24-25, 2003). The meetings provided a public forum through which the Commission received and exchanged information with subject matter experts, members of professional organizations and consultants, and received citizens'comments during the development of the the Commission's findings and recommendations.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Commission was established to advise the President and the Congress regarding the establishment and maintenance of the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, DC. On April 2, 2003, the Commission submitted its report containing recommendations with respect to a plan of action for the establishment and maintenance of the Museum; governance and site analyses; results of town hall meetings; a fundraising plan; and draft legislation to carry out the plan of action.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings? All meetings were open.

21. Remarks

The report of the Commission's findings and

recommendations was submitted to the President and the Congress on April 2, 2003. In accordance with PL 107-106, the Commission terminated on May 2, 2003 (30 days after submission of the report).
