20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The President's Commission on the United States Postal Service has been formed to examine the state of the Postal Service and prepare and submit a report articulating a vision for the future of the Postal Service, recommending the legislative and administrative steps necessary to enact reforms needed to ensure the viability of postal services. The Commission will draw upon expertise from its members, solicit and review written viewpoints from the public, and convene public meetings in various cities in the United States to receive verbal testimony.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Members were selected on a bipartisan basis. Care was given to ensure that members are not stakeholders in the mailing industry. They have a wide range of academic and professional backgrounds.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

Estimated that eight meetings will be held from January to July 2003.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Commission was established because the United States Postal Service touches every American. It is the linchpin of our domestic mailing industry, representing eight percent of our nation's Gross Domestic Product and nine million workers. It is timely to re-assess how the Postal Service should adapt to pressure from customers, competitors, and technology, and best fulfill its mission in the 21st century.
