20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The National Bioethics Advisory Commission advises, consults with, and makes recommendations to the National Science and Technology Council and its Chair, the President, Federal agencies, and other appropriate entities, including the scientific community, professional associations, academic institutions, Congress, and the public on the appropriateness of departmental, agency, or other governmental programs, policies, assignments, missions, guidelines, and regulations in their relationship to bioethical issues arising from biomedical, clinical and social research. It accomplishes these tasks through the following mechanisms: deliberations at Commission meetings, contracting/ commissioned papers from public, professional, and scientific experts in relevant fields, and through testimony by recognized experts and the public. In addition, opportunities are afforded the public at each meeting to provide comments. In FY 1999, the Commission completed three reports, one of which was in direct response to President Clinton's request. NBAC submitted to the President, through the National Science and Technology Council (NSTC), its report, Research Involving Persons with Mental Disorders That May Affect Decisionmaking Capacity (2 vol.). The report contained 21 recommendations designed to

enhance protections for human subjects who had mental disorders. The report was referred to the Committee on Science of the NSTC and to Federal agencies for comment. NBAC selected this topic because it was timely, raised critically important questions for the research community, and for patients and families. In July 1999, NBAC submitted its report, Research Involving Human Biological Materials: Ethical Issues and Policy Guidance (Executive Summary and Vol. 1; a second volume for this report containing commissioned papers will be published in FY 2000). NBAC selected this topic because advances in genetic research raised important concerns about the use of genetic (and non-genetic) information, there were disagreements amongst the scientific community about key issues, and because of perceived ambiguity in the Federal regulations. On November 14, 1998, the President asked the Commission to consider the ethical, medical, and legal implications of embryonic stem cell research, including the mingling of human and non-human species. NBAC submitted its report, Ethical Issues in Human Stem Cell Research, to the NSTC on September 7, 1999 (Executive Summary and Vol. 1; a second volume for this report containing commissioned papers, and a third volume containing the written testimony from eleven religious scholars will both be published in FY 2000).

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The President appointed 18 individuals, including the Commission chair, from a pool of knowledgeable non-government experts and community representatives with special qualifications and competence to provide effective recommendations on a wide range of bioethical issues. At least three members must represent the public and at least one member must be from the following areas of expertise: Philosophy/theology; social/behavioral science; law; medicine/allied health professions; and biological research.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The original charter stated that meetings may be called up to 10 times a year; the two renewal charters state that there may be up to 12 meetings a year. In order to respond to the very tight deadline for the specific reports requested by the President, the Commission has sometimes met more frequently than expected. The agendae of the meetings are focused on the various aspects of the specific issues being deliberated.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The President established the Commission after a twelve-year absence of any such body. The Commission is to identify broad, overarching principles to govern the ethical conduct of research. There are a considerable number of bioethical issues that impact not only on the ethical conduct of research, but the health and well being of the Nation.
