20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The purpose of the Commission is to provide advice to the President on changes occurring in the tobacco farming economy and recommend such measures as may be necessary to improve economic opportunity and development in communities that are dependent on tobacco production, and protect consumers, particularly children, from hazards associated with smoking. The Commission shall review information about changes in the tobacco farming economy and federal, state, and local initiatives intended to help tobacco growers, tobacco quota holders and communities dependent on tobacco production pursue new economic opportunities. The Commission may make recommendations concerning these, and other changes and initiatives that may be necessary to improve economic opportunity in communities dependent on tobacco production. It shall also consider the public health implications of such changes and initiatives, including the efforts to reduce youth smoking and tobacco related health consequences in the United States and abroad.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The members may include tobacco producers and quota holders; public health experts; Federal, state and local government representatives; and experts in agricultural economics and economic

development. Equal opportunity practices, in line with USDA policies, will be followed in all appointments to the Commission. To ensure that the recommendations of the Commission have taken into account the needs of the diverse groups served by the Department, membership should include, to the extent practicable, individuals with demonstrated ability to represent minorities, women, persons with disabilities, and senior citizens.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Commission is essential in order to assist tobacco farmers, quota holders and their communities adjust to changes in the tobacco economy and become less dependent on tobacco, while ensuring the continued protection of public health. Due to the different interests at stake and the intense public debate because of severe cuts in federal tobacco quotas, it is critical that a consensus of recommendations are developed by means of an advisory committee to ensure public involvement in the process.
