# 20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Study Section reviews research grant applications for scientific and technical merit. Its recommendations are advisory to the Administrator, Agency for Health Care Policy and Research (AHCPR) and to the appropriate n al advisory councils. During FY 1997, the Study Section reviewed 30 applications for a total of \$29,497.101. The Study Section also supports the review of certain grant applications using field reviewers who are paid fees ranging from \$50 to \$100 per review. A field reviewer may be a

member or non-member.

### 20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Membership during FY 1997 included physicians and non-physicians - the latter representing the fields of biostatistics, economics, operations research, nursing, psychology, and sociology. Special interests of the physicians include primary care, cardiology, epidemiology, quality assurance, emergency medicine, medical decision-making, and technology assessment. These professional specialties, disciplines, and interests are representative of those involved in the research and grant applications reviewed.

### 20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

This Study Section ordinarily meets three times each year in keeping with the practice of Public Health Service study sections which review research grant applications. Meetings are coordinated with the three deadlines for submission of applications. Scheduled meetings of the Study Section, which are planned a full year in advance, are essential to the continuation of the Agency's extramural program in health care technology assessment and quality assurance.

### 20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

By law, a panel of experts, primarily non-Federal, must review grant applications exceeding \$50,000 in direct cAWfor scientific merit. The Health Care Technology Study Section is the panel with the most appropriate mix of expertise for the review of technologically-oriented and quality assurance applications in health care delivery received by the Federal government. While reviewing primarily

applications assigned to the AHCPR, this Study Section also reviews those applications assigned to other PHS agencies, especially the National Institutes of Health, when they require expertise of the kind represented on this study section.

# 20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

Portions of the meetings involve the review, discussion, and evaluation of individual grant applications. These applications and the discussion of them are likely to reveal personal information concerning individuals associated with the applications.
