The primary purpose of this meeting was for the Committee to provide working group findings, identify actionable recommendations, and receive public briefings. The briefings are from outside subject matter experts to the full Committee from areas such as industry, nonprofit 10/10/2024 - 10/10/2024 organizations, the scientific community, the defense and law enforcement communities and other appropriate organizations. The agenda also included a briefing from a member of the UN High-Level Advisory Body and a discussion on a draft NAIAC Transition Report. The primary purpose of this meeting was to have invited guests brief the full Committee on topics of interest related to Al in Hardware and AI and Energy. The briefings, organized by the NAIAC's AI Futures-Preparedness, Opportunities, and Competitiveness Working Group, and follow-up discussion will address the following: As advancements in AI hardware fuel unprecedented growth in 11/21/2024 - 11/21/2024 applications, they also raise critical questions about energy use and sustainability. These two briefings will delve into the trajectory of Al hardware development for both pre-training and inference, examining the driving forces behind these innovations and the evolving energy supply and demand landscape in response to the burgeoning AI sector. 20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Committee provides advice to the President and the National Artificial Intelligence Initiative Office on matters related to the National Artificial Intelligence Initiative (Initiative). The purposes of the Initiative are: (1) ensuring continued United States leadership in artificial intelligence research and development; (2) leading the world in the development and use of trustworthy artificial intelligence systems in the public and private sectors; (3) preparing the present and future United States workforce for the integration of artificial intelligence systems across all sectors of the economy and society; and (4) coordinating ongoing artificial intelligence research, development, and demonstration activities among the civilian agencies, the Department of Defense, and the Intelligence Community to ensure that each informs the work of the others.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Members of the Committee are appointed by the Secretary of Commerce. The Committee represents broad and interdisciplinary expertise and perspectives, including academic institutions, companies across diverse sectors, nonprofit and civil society entities, including civil rights and disability rights and organizations, and Federal laboratories, who represent geographic diversity, who are qualified to provide advice and information on science and technology research, development, ethics, standards, education, technology, commercial application, security, and economic competitiveness related to artificial intelligence. In selecting members of the Committee, the Secretary of Commerce has given consideration to recommendations from Congress, industry, nonprofit organizations, the scientific community (including the National Academies of Science, Engineering, and Medicine, scientific professional societies, and academic institutions), the defense and law enforcement communities and other appropriate organizations. The NAIAC is statutorily required to meet twice a year. In FY25, the NAIAC met four times. The Committee meetings included briefing sessions with experts as well as deliberations on recommendations and various documents.

Section 5104 of the National Artificial Intelligence Initiative Act of 2020 (Pub.L.No 116-283) states that the Secretary of Commerce, in consultation with the Director of the Office of Science and Technology Policy, the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of Energy, the Secretary of State, the Attorney General, and the Director of National Intelligence shall establish the "National Artificial Intelligence Advisory Committee" in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended (FACA), 5 U.S.C. § 1001 et seq.
